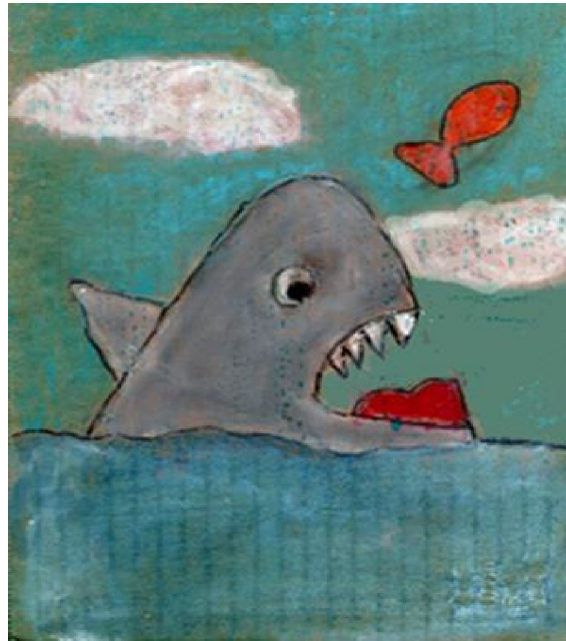


# Clark the Shark

Begin by listening to the story of *Clark the Shark*, written by Bruce Hale, read by Chris Pine <https://youtu.be/lgZRMptA0Lk>. Chris Pine is an American actor that starred in many feature films such as *Star Trek* and *Wonder Woman*.

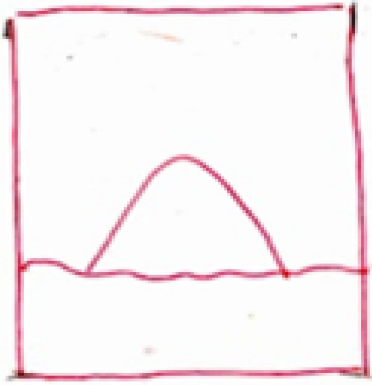
After hearing the story, think about these questions:

- ★ Why is it important to follow rules?
- ★ Have you ever played too rough? What happened?

Now you can follow these directions and learn how to draw a shark!

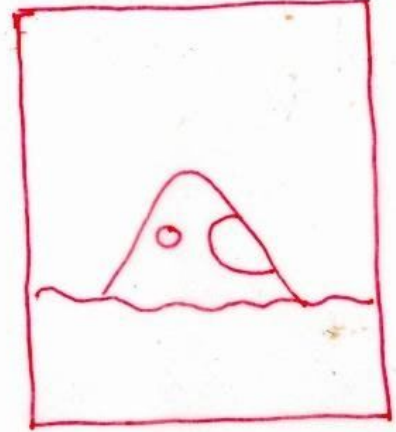
You will need the following materials:

- Drawing tutorial (included in this lesson)
- 8 x 10 piece of cardboard (can be a recycled empty cereal or cracker box, etc)
- Crayons or oil pastels (or any other coloring materials, markers, colored pencils, paint)



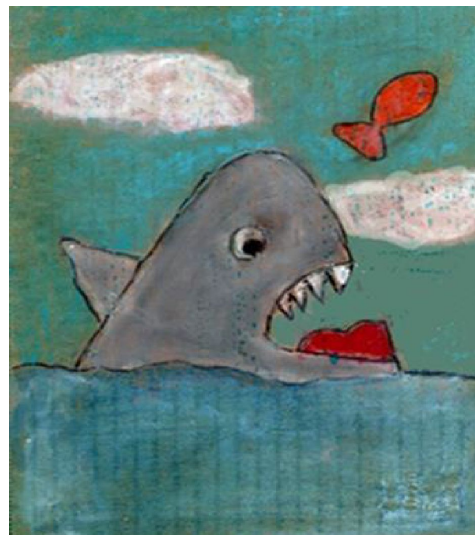
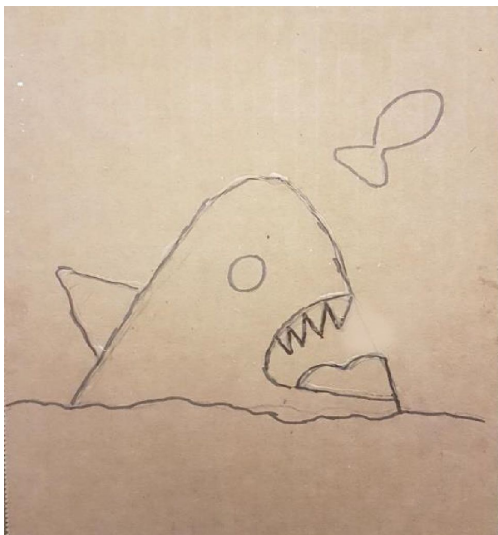
1). On the 8x10 piece of cardboard draw a triangle for the shark's head and wavy lines for the water. When sharks jump out of the water it's called breaching.

2). Draw a sideways "U" for the mouth and a small circle for the eye. Great white sharks roll their pupils/eyes back when attacking, to prevent injury.



3). Draw another triangle for the fin and teeth, a "M" for the tongue. Sharks can go several weeks without eating.

Once you have drawn the shark, color it with crayons or oil pastels.
